ost of the year was spent preparing the MOBIUS office to manage their own Human Resources. As of July 1, 2014, the MOBIUS staff were no longer University of Missouri employees. This involved a tremendous amount of work by the Board of Directors and the MOBIUS staff. We hired an HR Consultant who assisted us with all aspects of establishing our own HR policies, procedures, benefits, and payroll. We are now fully separated from the University and managing all aspects of our organization.

he MOBIUS Office welcomed a new employee on August 6, 2013.

Stephen Strohl joined us as our Implementation Coordinator after working at Innovative Interfaces for 13 years. Steve is an alumni of the University of Missouri and is happy to be back in the Columbia area. His wife, Jeannette Pierce, works as the Associate Director for Research & Information Services at Ellis Library, University of Missouri.

e welcomed new member libraries to MOBIUS. Evangel University went live on the SWAN Cluster on October 30, 2013. Tulsa City-County Library agreed to become our first outof-state member library. We also made an agreement with the Colorado Alliance of Research Libraries (Prospector) to connect our InnReach systems together with the Peer-to-Peer software from Innovative. This would allow us to share materials with their 44 member.

libraries. This is the first time two large consortia have agreed to share materials across state lines and we have been sharing our experience with other libraries, consortia, and at conferences.

or the first time since MOBIUS was formed, we welcomed the addition of a new cluster, Explore. Explore includes the St. Louis Art Museum, Missouri Botanical Garden, Missouri History Museum, and Barnes Jewish College Goldfarb School of Nursing. They will go live in the spring of 2015.

eaching across state lines brought us some unexpected benefits. Our libraries I now have courier access to more than 255 member libraries of the Trans-Amigos Express which includes Texas, Arkansas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. The new partnership with Prospector allowed us to connect our courier system to almost 300 libraries in Colorado via the Colorado courier, CLiC. Not only did we increase access to more collections, but we saved our libraries money by expanding our courier service. Trans Amigos Express service began

on June 10, 2014 and CLiC

service began on August 5,

n July 1, 2013, MOBIUS began an ebook subscription for the consortium to about 138,000 titles from EBSCO. We spent most of the last year evaluating and selecting a vendor. Fifty-nine of our libraries are participating in the eMO project. There were 289,181 eMO sessions in the first year. Our e-resource offerings grew from 12 products to 69. Last year our member libraries saved \$3,247,155 by subscribing to e-resources through MOBIUS.

be Access Management was added to the MOBIUS Union Catalog so that we could use one proxy link for the eMO collection. It took most of the year to work through this implementation. Encore was installed on the MOBIUS Union Catalog which will eventually become our main point of access to the union catalog. We also

began the process of installing and configuring Enhanced Matchpoint, an Innovative product that will remove duplicates, separate electronic records from print records, and complete other record cleanup on the catalog.

our member libraries subscribed to Sky-River, a bibliographic cataloging utility, sold by Innovative Interfaces. William Jewell College, Moberly Area Community College, Kansas City Art Institute, and Covenant Theological Seminary all subscribed this year and will give a report to the membership in the spring of 2015 about their experience.

The MOBIUS Annual Conference underwent some changes this year. We created tracks this year which included Collections: Development, Management & Access, Leadership & Management, Market-

ing & Outreach, and Practical Applications of Sierra. Instead of an evening keynote, we invited keynotes for each track. We were very lucky to have some well-known speakers--Rick Anderson, Susan Ashby, Erin Dorney and Jill Emery. Innovative Interfaces hosted dine-arounds for Monday evening, shuttling guests to 4 area restaurants to eat dinner

Training Institute offered a full day session on training day about Motivating Employees. Overall, the conference was another success and the changes were well received.

Becoming a fresh and innovative organization has stretched our thinking, created new perspectives and challenges, and forced compromise on all levels. We have the opportunity to expand our organi-




OBIUS entered a third year contract with the Missouri State Library to host and manage the Missouri Evergreen Consortium on September 1, 2013. It was a productive and busy year. Nine member libraries of the consortium migrated onto the Evergreen ILS and began resource sharing in FY 2014—including Ozark Regional Library, which was an un-automated, eight-branch system. Five libraries joined the consortium this year: Webb City Public, Sullivan Public, Sikeston Public, Marion County Subdistrict #1, and Schuyler County. MOBIUS hired Blake Graham-Henderson, who was previously the MOBIUS System Administrator, to be the Evergreen programmer. He officially began working with Evergreen on October 1, 2013, although he started working on a few issues before that date. Blake jumped right in on learning the

Evergreen database and assisting members with migrations, help desk, and much more.

was a year where Missouri Evergreen began to mature as a consortium, setting up policies and refining bylaws. In an effort to better communicate and make decisions, the membership decided to meet monthly, rather than every other month. The Executive Committee formed several membership committees to address particular needs, such as Cataloging, OPAC, Circulation, and Publicity/PR. In coordination with the State Library and the MOBIUS staff, the Executive Committee worked to set priorities for the consortium and to begin work on strategic and financial planning. The Cataloging Committee met in person to discuss and create a cataloging policy for the consortium, which was approved at the July 2014 membership meeting. All catalogers

were required to complete a free online training course in Technical Services through Idaho ABLE. The consortium also chose to add enhanced content from Syndetics to the catalog, and considered a consortial purchase of the Book-Where cataloging utility, but decided not to pursue that as a group. At the end of the year, at the June membership meeting, the consortium voted on two new **Executive Committee members** for three-vear terms, and the Executive Committee chose new officers for the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

ne big project that began during this year was catalog cleanup. With so many libraries being migrated in a relatively short period, with varying levels of cataloging expertise, and after the deduplication procedure in FY 2013, there were were some problems with item formats and bibliographic records.

MISSOURI EVERGREEN (CONTINUED)

he Cataloging Committee and the MOBIUS staff worked on a plan for correcting and cleaning up the cataloging, and work began on that project (and will continue into FY 2015). The project includes a combination of software Blake develops to identify and fix records and humans looking at remaining bibs and MOLIB2GO e-book and e-audiobook records to add them to the catalog, with proper formatting so they only appear at libraries that subscribe to MOLIB2GO. Part of this script also searches for print records incorrectly attached to electronic records and corrects them.

he technology used by Missouri Evergreen also continued to evolve. We moved from Evergreen version 2.3.3 to version 2.4.0, then at the end of the year, to 2.6.1. Each of these upgrades included bug fixes and new features contributed by the larger Evergreen community. The database servers were also upgraded to Postgres 9.2, Virtual Hosts moved to Hyper-V, and SSL certificates were updated. Several virtual servers were created to better test new features. upgrades, and software.

OBIUS Missouri Evergreen staff performed myriad tasks, including: help desk, communication with members and potential members, training, aforementioned technol-

ogy upgrades, system setup and migrations, upgrades, software development, creating helpful videos, administrative tasks, visiting member and potential member libraries, creating and revising training documentation, and updating the Missouri Evergreen website. They participated in the larger Evergreen community with discussion, software patches, hosting test servers, participating on committees, and attending the annual Evergreen International Conference. A Table Talk about Missouri Evergreen also took place at the Missouri Library Association Annual Conference in October 2013, and was well attended by both current members and interested libraries. MOBIUS staff also began working on the Year Four contract with the Missouri State Library and the Executive Committee, which continues into FY2015, since the contracts begin on September 1. Since most of the current Missouri Evergreen member libraries will have migrated onto the Evergreen ILS, a new plan needed to be worked on to handle other tasks, like continued catalog cleanup, and implementation of features, such as Acquisitions.

his an exciting time to be a part of this open-source resource-sharing consortium, as it continues to grow and mature.
